Foreign ministers meet in Doha today

DOHA: On agenda of today's GCC foreign ministers' meeting being held here are a number of key issues and it includes the proposed joint tourist visa swetom

Today's meeting is being held in preparation for the GCC Summit, which is scheduled to be held here on December 9 and 10. J16. The project is being devel-bed by Manateq, a state-backed oped by entity, which was specifically cre-ated in 2011 to provide the necessary infrastructure, policies, and services required by Small and Medium Entreprises (SMEs). The ambitious Ras Bufontas

project, strategically located near the Hamad International Airport, is being developed in an area of

over 4.1sqkm. The specialised zone will be dedicated to companies from communications, infotech, energy, logistics, construction, transportation and other sectors, with an aim to achieve sustainable and diversified economic develop

ment in the energy-rich economy. The Prime Minister told the media that the new project is one of three new economic zones that will represent a big lift to the economy. Sheikh Abdullah added

More recreation and less work for some in Qatar

DOHA: The average Qatari spends barely a tenth of his day on income generating activities, while an expatriate slogs two-and-a-half times more. An official survey shows that the average Qatari devotes only two hours and 52 minutes a day to income-generating activi-ties, which is 11.9 percent of his 24-hours. On the other hand, this average for the expatriate is nearly two-and-a-half times more: Six hours and 42 minutes (or 27.9 percent of his 24-hours). On recreation and culture a Qatari on average spends much more time (five hours and 17 min-utes a day, or 22 percent of his day). The expatriate spends marehy three hours and 31 minutes a day, or 146 percent of his 24-hour rou-ting on rewretime for dwitnes

or 14.6 percent of his 24-hour rou-

or 14.6 percent of his 24-hour rou-tine, on recreation and culture. Income generating activities include working for wage/salary, providing employment to others as well as self-employment. Recreation and culture include watching TV, reading books, surf-ing the Internet, travelling, pursu-ing hobbies and visiting relatives. Qatari men on average spend a little more time on recreation (five hours and 32 minutes, or 23 percent of their day) than their women (who spend five hours and

On household chores like wash-ing, cleaning, cooking, shopping and caring for children and eld-erly, Qatari men spend two hours 37 minutes a day. This average for non-Qataris is two hours and five minites. A Qatari on average devoted 49 minutes a day to prayers, while expatriates spent almost half that time (28 minutes) on it. However, both the categories

of the people spent nearly half their day on sleeping and personal care: 11 hours and 18 minutes for Qataris, and 10 hours and 51 min-

utes for non-Qataris. A 'Time use' survey conducted by the Ministry of Development Planning and Statistics reveals the

Planning and Statistics reveals the above and other interesting details. The survey was carried out for the first time in the country from September 20, 2012 to September 19, 2013, said the Ministry in its findings. 500 more taxis to hit roads

DOHA: Some 500 new taxis will DOHA: Some 500 new taxis will hit the road soon, as a new pri-vate company has been granted permission by Mowasalat to operate taxis on a franchise basis, a senior Mowasalat offi-cial said yesterday. The new company will start oper-ations early next year, Mowasalat CEO Khalid Nasser Al Hail said.

Mowasalat is set to double its by Mowasalat is set to double its by 2022. In another eight years, the number of taxis operating in Qatar would be ?000, said Al Hail. Currently, a total of 4000 taxis are operating in Qatar. An esti-mated 3,500 are on the road on a daily basis. "Now we have reduced the operating fee of franchises.

Earli the franchisee had to Earlier, the franchisee had to pay QR1510 per cab. It has been reduced to QR1,000. Currently, we do not have problems in getting new franchisees," he said. Mowasalat will also addg more buses. Fifty new buses are expected to be on the road by the end of this year, he said. THE PENINSULA

Seasonal flu cases on the rise

Change in weather cited as cause

DOHA: As temperatures go down, there is a surge in sea-sonal flu cases. Workers are taking time off and clinics are crowded with people suffering from influenza-like symptoms while teachers are reporting students absent from school. "Even these among us unbulker

"For those among us unlucky enough to be vulnerable to such things, the change of season can mean sickness is inevitable," said "I took two days off when I was down with flu and at least half of

my colleagues at office have also missed a day or two of work with similar problems."

missel a day or two of work with similar problems." Health experts say that a rise for fall in temperature can affect ur immune systems. With cold and windy weather set to continue across the region, people are being purged to be more vigilant to help balt the spread of the winter virus. "There has been a rise in the number of flu cases especially among children," said one doctor at a private clinic. He said there were more cases of the and influenza during winter months because the heat, which is a natural protector against flu and kills most viruses, has gone way. Secondly, the air is dryer and this thins the lining of the nose and mouth making people more prone to illnesses. He recommended that any-fome and avoid going to work. "Covering the mouth when you

Young children and those over 65 and pregnant women should protect themselves by getting vac-cinated, have a good sleep, take flu remedies such as honey and drinking plenty of fluids, he said. For those down with flu, he rec-ommended a Vitamin C-rich diet, plenty of fluids and paracetamol. Schools were also feeling the effects of winter virus. Yousef Musoke, a parent, said his two of his children had missed school at least twice in the last two weeks. "There school has seen newslet-ters advising parents on how to

An Egyptian expatriate, Salah Ahmed, believed that people were fooled into thinking that because they lived in a hot climate they would not gef thu. 'I usually get sick two or three times a year. Right now, for example, I feel 1 an devel-oping flu-type symptoms. There is in sick every two days at my work.''
